PLEIN AIR PAINTING

Several Gallery 510 artists paint plein air and have taken plein air workshops with international artists. Plein air painters create their work outdoors and enjoy the ability to see color and light with renewed enthusiasm. There has been an explosion of interest in painting plein air in recent years. Plein air painters use pastels, oils or even watercolors. There are plein air festivals and "paintouts" around the country for artists to enjoy and patrons to visit and watch artists create their works. Plein air paintings are usually completed in a few hours and in one session, start to finish. They are most often loose and impressionistic.



THE GALLERY FRAME SHOP

"Stacking Frames"

Pastel artists all know that their work must be under glass and the glass must not touch the art. If you choose not to use mats on your pastel then a separation needs to be created in another way. One way is to stack frames. Choose a narrow frame to go next to the artwork to separate the art from the glass then stack another frame on top to hold the glass in place. It's a beautiful way to frame a pastel painting. In addition to using an actual frame to separate the painting from the glass, an attractive fillet can be used, too. This alleviates the need for a deeper outer frame. A fillet is a slim piece of wood usually used to enhance a frame or placed between the art and the mat.

Stacking frames can be used for other works, too. A narrow frame with beading or in gold or another color can be used inside a deeper frame to enhance it. Create your own look to suit your style.
